




## VMS Annual Report 2025

VMS had a range of activities this year, some that are held annually, others like the Listening Circles that are part of a series, some initiated by VMS and other that were initiated by other groups with our collaboration, such as the World Religions Conference and the Hiroshima-Nagasaki commemoration.

The Victoria Multifaith Society board has met monthly over the past year, overseeing events and ongoing projects inspired by our mission statement:

to Learn from each other, to Celebrate our unity in diversity, and to Work together for the well-being for the community and the world.





## World Interfaith Harmony Week

World Religions Conference, 2 Feb. 2025

In honour of World Interfaith Harmony Week, VMS continues to support the World Religions Conference organized by the Ahmadiyya community, which is held annually at the Saanich Commonwealth Centre. On February 2<sup>nd</sup>, 225 people attended in spite of less-than-optimal weather conditions!

Speakers from 8 faiths presented their spiritual teachings on the theme of *Healing in a Polarized World* followed by an enormous East Indian meal provided by the Ahmadiyya community.

The Conference for 2026 will take place at the same venue on Sunday Feb. 1 on the theme of Building Bridges between our communities. Guiding Question for Discussion: *How does your religion contribute to uniting humanity for the common good?* We hope that this theme will spark meaningful dialogue, inspire collective action, and highlight the shared values that can bridge divides across diverse communities.



### Spiritually Speaking/Faith Forum

We continue to be enormously proud of this ongoing project of VMS, the Faith Forum column and Spiritually Speaking blog appearing in the print and online editions of the Victoria Times-Colonist newspaper.

The idea of this column and blog is for writers of faith to share a spiritual perspective on world issues, or to share elements of their faith that may be misunderstood or unknown. Writers also enjoy sharing an event, celebration or religious observance.

We're very grateful to Anna Bowness-Park who initiated both the column and blog in 2009 and has continued to moderate it and guide its progress.

The project began back with eight rotating writers and has grown over the years. There are currently around 25 writers from a large range of faith traditions contributing once or twice a week. An article for the Times Colonist print edition is published every Saturday on the Religion page and then published on the blog the same day. It can be found by googling Spiritually Speaking Times Colonist.



## Honouring Peace: Hiroshima-Nagasaki Day

For the 4<sup>th</sup> consecutive year, VMS has supported the annual event honouring Hiroshima-Nagasaki Day, held on August 6<sup>th</sup>, 2025, at the beautiful Japanese-style Gorge Park Pavilion. This year was the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary, commemorating those who died in the nuclear blasts on August 6<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup>, 1945.

The entire ground floor of the pavilion was dedicated to displays and lantern-making from 6pm to 7pm, followed by an outdoor program of entertainment interspersed with short speeches. At sunset there was a ceremonial "launching of the lanterns" in the pavilion reflective pools.

The event was a cooperative effort between the Greater Victoria Peace School, The Raging Grannies, the Bahá'í community of Esquimalt, the Victoria Nikkei Cultural Society, and the International Physicians for the Prevention of Nuclear War Canada.



# Spiritual Perspectives on Hot Topics

The VMS project Spiritual Perspectives on Hot Topics was

created as an opportunity for people of various backgrounds and faiths to come together to discuss complex and/or challenging issues from a faith perspective. Various faith communities host and propose a topic of concern that

would be of interest to the public.

The project began in 2024, with the first meeting held at the Victoria Truth Centre on the theme of Social Media and its impact on children and youth. Earlier this year a meeting was held at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day

Saints on the subject "How will you measure your life?" about priorities in work and life and the critical importance of family and relationships.

Every faith community has its own gifts and teachings that apply to the problems that currently plague the world, and this is one way to share them in an atmosphere of openness, tolerance and curiosity.



# Listening Circles

On four Tuesday evenings of May and June of this year, a group of

25 to 35 people gathered at Christ Church Cathedral for a series of bi-weekly Listening Circles. This project began in 2024, bringing together people from the Abrahamic faiths – Jewish, Muslim, Christian and Baha'i – who have direct ties to Israel/Palestine.

Presenters this year were from the Jewish and Muslim communities: Hanan Abousaleh, Dahlia Beck, Mustafa Abousaleh and Rabbi Harry Brechner. Each was given an evening to present their perspectives, followed by Q&A and

mixed discussion groups of 6 to 8. Questions and conversations were sometimes difficult, but participants expressed gratitude for the opportunity to contribute to the dialogue and to form personal bonds with one another.

VMS is grateful to Christ Church Cathedral for providing this incredible venue to bring our communities together; to Yasser Yousef of Fig Deli for his support by more than once catering dinners for the entire group; and to Jennie Keeran of the Christian community for providing refreshments.




## One Spirit: Celebrating Our Faiths Together

On September 21<sup>st</sup>, 2025, VMS again collaborated with the Victoria Hindu Parishad and Cultural Centre to host the annual event *One Spirit: Celebrating Our Faiths Together*.

One Spirit: Celebrating our Faiths Together is an annual multifaith arts devotional co-sponsored by the Hindu Temple and the Victoria Multifaith Society, held this year on 21 September. An estimated 90 people attended this community event, with uplifting, presentations in multiple forms: chanting, singing, guitar, dance, and drumming.

The program started with a First Nations blessing by Patrick Leon, ending with a Sufi Dance of Universal Peace, and in between presentations from many communities: Muslim, Christian, Jewish, Sikh, Hindu, Buddhist and Baha'i. A vegetarian Indian meal was offered by the Urban Rebar restaurant and served by volunteers.



#### Multifaith Youth Council

Beginning in the Fall of 2024, the Multifaith Youth Council formed and developed a mandate and mission statement.

It's now in the process of developing a program to implement them.

This wonderful group meets monthly at the Cook Street
Activity Centre. It is currently composed of Naeem Tohidi
of the Baha'i Faith, Zaynab (Jenny) Majzoub who is Sunni
Muslim, Annie Konstantinova of the Jewish community,
Tanisha Carter representing Indigenous Spirituality and, most

recently, Gurkeerat Kaur Makker of the Sikh community.


We're very fortunate to have this enthusiastic group. We're looking forward to seeing them build bridges of understanding and openness between faith groups, between youth of faith and no faith, and increasing participation of youth in interfaith activities.



#### **ILN:** Interfaith Liaisons Network

The meetings of the Interfaith Liaison Network (a project of the Victoria Multifaith Society) have covered topics such as Temples & Holy Places, the Role of Forgiveness, Prophecy, Faiths Changing in Response to the World, and the Role of Women in our various faiths, followed by discussion. The sharing circle format allows us to get to know each other as well as learn about different religions.

ILN meets at the Friends Meeting House on Fern Street on the third Wednesday of the month from 2:30 to 3:30, usually with a group of 6 to 10 people from traditions such as Jewish, Quaker, United Church, Catholic, Sunni Muslim, Latter Day Saints, Hindu and Baha'i. Newcomers from other denominations and traditions are welcome to join. The Quaker friends, and in particular Derek Hawksley, are warmly thanked for faithfully providing the venue and hospitality for each meeting.



### The Giving Machine: Nov. 15 – Dec. 3

In addition to these projects, VMS is happy to support the Giving Machine project initiated by the Church of Christ of

Latter-Day Saints by providing publicity through our networks. This new charitable project will be set up in Tillicum Mall from Nov 15 to Dec 3, 2025.

The Giving Machine is a vending machine-like dispenser that instead of selling candy or beverages dispenses items such as goats, chickens, warm clothing, meals, and hygiene items. Donors purchase items or services for people in need through local and global charities.

Donations are made via credit/debit cards or mobile payments like Apple Pay or Google Pay. 100% of donations go directly to the designated charities, with operational costs covered by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

VMS has welcomed this project as a form of collaboration that helps to fulfil our mandate to "work together for the benefit of the community and the world".

# **Annual Financial Report**

VMS has always operated on a relatively small budget, relying mainly on the donations of our members and generous in-kind donations of places such as Christ Church Cathedral, which has offered its facilities and services not only for our 2025 AGM but for the entire Listening Circles series of 2024 and 2025, for which we are incredibly grateful.

VMS pays no salaries or stipends for the work carried out on its behalf. We also very much appreciate the time and commitment of the board members, Executive Director and our Members who allow us to pay for such things as fees, supplies and honorariums. This is a true community effort.

Our expenses for the year amounted to \$1409.62.

Our revenue was \$1019.03.

Our current account stands at \$6924.46, since our opening balance was \$7315.05 and we spent about \$390 more than we took in during this past fiscal year.



# **Charitable Donations**

VMS has recently acquired a Square, a small portable device that allows people to donate using their credit card or phone. For those wishing a receipt, donations can be easily made by e-transfer directly on our website, by clicking on the Donate / Join button. Printable receipts are given automatically through Canada Helps for every donation of \$20.00 or more. Membership continues to be free with any donation.




